#### SOUTH AFRICA'S DEMOCRACY IS "STRONG, ROBUST" - PRESIDENT RAMAPHOSA

President Cyril Ramaphosa says the 16 million citizens who cast their vote in the National and Provincial Elections, were proof that South Africa's democracy is "strong and robust".

The President was addressing the nation through his weekly newsletter on Monday, 3 June 2024.

South Africans headed to the polls last week to elect new government leadership for the seventh administration in the country's most competitive elections since the dawn of democracy in 1994.


"This election has been declared free and fair. It took place peacefully and without serious incidents of intimidation or violence. This is a credit to the Electoral Commission, to the political parties and their leadership and above all, to the South African people.

"By discharging this important civic duty, South Africans have done more than exercise their right to vote. They have shown that they continue to hold our democratic order and our Constitution in high regard. This successful poll shows that our democracy is strong, that it is robust and that it endures," President Ramaphosa said.

#### **Constitutional order**

In this year's vote, no party won an outright majority in the National Assembly.

This, President Ramaphosa said, presented a "new phase in our democratic journey" in which "political parties will have to strive in earnest to find common ground as we work to rebuild our country".



"By going to vote, the people of South Africa have taken responsibility not only for the future of themselves and their families, but for the future of their country. Through their votes they have demonstrated, clearly and plainly, that our democracy is strong, it is robust and it endures"

"Although every political party carries a mandate based on the commitments they made to the electorate, all parties share an overarching mandate to build a country that is inclusive, united and prosperous.

"This moment in our country calls for responsible leadership and constructive engagement. There can be no place for threats of violence or instability," he said.

The President called on South Africans to fight for and protect the country's constitutional order - South Africa's supreme law.

"This constitutional order is anchored in the rule of law, supported by institutions for advancing democracy, such as the Independent Electoral Commission and upheld by an independent judiciary.

"South Africans must stand firm against any attempts to undermine the constitutional order we have worked so hard to build and for which so many struggled and sacrificed.

"Whatever challenges we may face as political events unfold, they should be dealt with in a spirit of cooperation and in accordance with the prescripts of our Constitution and the rule of law," he said.

The President added that all South Africans should take pride in "our own contribution towards giving meaning to the values and principles of our constitutional democracy".

"As we work as political parties to find each other across the divide in the coming weeks and months, let us demonstrate both in our actions and our utterances that we hold the Constitution and the rule of law to be paramount. Let us remember that whatever authority or whatever power we are entrusted with, must be exercised to advance the interests of the South African people.

"Now more than ever, we need to put our differences aside and work together for the common good," President Ramaphosa concluded.

#### CONDOLENCES FOR EASTERN CAPE FLOOD VICTIMS

President Cyril Ramaphosa has extended his condolences to the families who have lost loved ones due to severe flooding in the Eastern Cape.







By Monday morning, 3 June 2024, at least seven people had lost their lives in the floods with reports of some 1200 people displaced.

Areas most hit by the inclement weather were Nelson Mandela Bay, Buffalo City and Kariega.

"The loss of life, the destruction of public infrastructure and the loss of personal property brought about by the forces of nature saddens all of us as South Africans.

"The aftermath of these occurrences is best overcome when we work together in the way we are seeing in the Eastern Cape." President Ramaphosa said.

In a statement, The Presidency said the President urged South Africans to heed weather warnings.

"President Ramaphosa commends the way in which authorities, communities, non-governmental organisations and individuals are dealing with rescue and recovery efforts, including the rehousing of a significant number of families who have been displaced.

"Given the potential impacts of the winter season on various parts of the country, President Ramaphosa urges the public to keep safe by heeding weather alerts and exercising greater care and restraint on our roads in poor weather conditions.

"The President also calls on citizens to reach out to vulnerable members of their families and communities, to make this season as comfortable and safe as possible for people who have limited resources or live on their own," the statement read. – Source: SAnews.gov.za

#### DEFENCE FORCE SADDENED BY THE DEATH OF SADC MEMBER

The South African National Defence Force saddened by the death of one member in the Eastern Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC).

The South African National Defence Force (SANDF) was saddened to announce the death of one member of the Southern African Development Community (SADC) Mission in the Democratic Republic of the Congo (SAMIDRC) on Thursday, 30 May 2024 at Sake following the encounter with M23 rebels in the Eastern DRC.

The name of the deceased will be mentioned once the family members have been informed. The Minister of Defence and Military Veterans, Thandi Modise; the Deputy Minister of Defence



and Military Veterans, Thabang Makwetla; the Acting Secretary for Defence, Dr Thobekile Gamede; and the Chief of the South African National Defence Force, General Rudzani Maphwanya, expressed their deepest and heartfelt condolences to the family, friends and colleagues for this unfortunate passing. – Source: <a href="https://www.gov.za">www.gov.za</a>

## SOUTH AFRICAN ELECTIONS WERE HELD UNDER "PEACEFUL" CONDITIONS – AFRICAN UNION MISSION

Head of the African Union Election Observation Mission (AUEOM), former Kenyan President Uhuru Kenyatta, has declared that South Africa's 2024 National and Provincial Elections were held under peaceful conditions.



The observer mission was deployed to South Africa from 21 May at the invitation of the South African Government and the Electoral Commission of South Africa (IEC).

This was as South Africans went to the polls on Wednesday, 29 May.

"Overall, the mission notes that the 2024 South African National and Provincial Elections were pivotal for the country's democratic future and had implications for political stability within South Africa and the subregion.

"South Africans freely exercised their constitutional right to vote and voted peacefully. The participation of youth and women offers hope for the future of democracy in Africa and indicates an increased trust in the electoral process.

"While the electoral process is still ongoing, we implore all aggrieved parties to use the existing election dispute resolution mechanisms to address their grievances, if any," Kenyatta said in a preliminary statement.

AUEOM staff were deployed to several parts of the country to observe aspects of the elections.

"Since arriving in South Africa, the AUEOM engaged with key stakeholders, including the IEC, the media, civil society organisations, faith-based organisations, representatives of the international community, citizens' observer groups and heads of other election observer missions, the African Diplomatic Corps and the international community, and academia.

"The Mission deployed 21 teams of 65 observers across nine provinces to observe the special voting on 28 May and polling on 29 May 2024, focusing on various aspects of the electoral process. A final report with comprehensive findings and recommendations will be issued two months after the elections," Kenyatta stated.

He observed that the National and Provincial Elections (NPE2024) were held with "a renewed enthusiasm among South Africans to strengthen their democratic gains".

"This election was notably competitive due to the emergence of several new political parties. Despite the peaceful and credible nature of the previous six elections, the 2024 elections were marked by a tense political environment, intensified by several litigations.

"The pre-election period saw heightened tensions and concerns over the potential misuse of social media for spreading fake news, disinformation, and misinformation, which could incite violence.

"Nevertheless, the elections proceeded without major incidents, maintaining a pattern of peaceful conduct. Despite the challenges and tensions, the 2024 elections were conducted peacefully, demonstrating the resilience of South Africa's democratic processes," Kenyatta said. – Source: SAnews.gov.za

#### SADC ELECTORAL MISSION GIVES ELECTIONS 2024 SEAL OF APPROVAL

The Southern African Development Community Electoral Observation Mission (SEOM) has described the preelection and voting phases of South Africa's National and Provincial Elections as having been held in an "orderly, peaceful and free atmosphere".

South Africa's elections were held by the Electoral Commission (IEC) on Wednesday, 29 May.



In a preliminary statement, former Zambian Vice President and SEOM Head, Enock Kavindele, said some 84 observers were deployed to all nine provinces and they engaged with stakeholders from all parts of society on the elections.

"The mission observed that the country was calm and peaceful in the pre-election, election day, and the immediate post-election period. I must emphasise that this was a very conducive environment for the elections, where only a few isolated incidences of political violence were reported.

"It was the concern of stakeholders that the incidences prevented special voting and final election campaign events in the areas. Apart from these isolated incidences, our observers deployed across the country witnessed numerous peaceful, well-planned and highly attended political rallies," he said.

He noted that the South African Police Service (SAPS) "maintained its vigilance and preserved peace" during the election period, with "more resources to high-risk areas to address eventualities".

#### Best practice and recommendations

The mission praised the IEC for its best practices on the following:

- Online voter registration for citizens, including in the diaspora, which encouraged young and first-time voters to register.
- With the support of the Department of International Relations and Cooperation, for facilitating voting by South African residents abroad
- Implementation of special voting, particularly to include voters who for reasons of infirmity or other challenges, would not have been able to cast their votes at the polling stations
- Swift responsiveness to false, misleading information, particularly online and social media.
- Openness to the public and close liaison with political parties and independent candidates.

Kavindele said that while the mission to the South African elections has not expired yet, it has made some recommendations which include:

- Government and the National Assembly are urged to ensure that substantive electoral law reforms are debated and adopted early in the next electoral cycle in order to avoid the introduction of electoral reforms close to the election periods.
- The IEC is urged to assess options on how best to ensure that the voter management devices do not present challenges encountered
  on Election Day. The IEC could consider a manual voter's roll to be displayed at polling stations so that voters can verify where they
  are registered.
- The IEC is encouraged to review its civic and voter education programmes, learning from the challenges experienced in 2024 and design new programmes that comprehensively address the new electoral processes.
- The SAPS should consider recruiting adequate police officers to be permanently stationed all polling stations.
- "In conclusion, the SEOM observed that the pre-election and voting phases of the 2024 National and Provincial Assembly Elections were professionally organised and conducted in an orderly, peaceful and free atmosphere, which enabled the voters to express their democratic will and those who sought office to campaign freely.

"The mission commends the people of South Africa for the political maturity, spirit of tolerance and calm that generally prevailed during this electoral period. In the event of any electoral disputes, the mission appeals to all contestants to channel their concerns through established legal procedures and processes," Kavindele said. – Source: SAnews.gov.za

## RESEARCH INTO CLIMATE CHANGE ADAPTATION AND MITIGATION RECEIVES US\$92 MILLION

The National Research Foundation (NRF) has welcomed the announcement of a US\$92 million investment into the International Joint Initiative for Research in Climate Change Adaptation and Mitigation.

Research into Climate Change Adaptation and Mitigation

**RECEIVES A MULTIMILLION BOOST** 



The Canada Research Coordinating Committee, which leads this global joint initiative that funds interdisciplinary and trans-sectoral research on key risks of climate change, announced this in Ottawa, Canada, on Monday, 3 June 2024.

The Canada Research Coordinating Committee is part of a consortium of research funders with which the NRF is working under the International Joint Initiative for Research in Climate Change Adaptation and Mitigation.

The other research funders are from Brazil, Germany, Norway, Switzerland, the United Kingdom and the United States.

"In its role as a participating research funder in the initiative, the NRF funds four South African research projects," the NRF explained.

Two other local projects under the initiative are funded by the New Frontiers in Research Fund (NFRF), which supports world-leading interdisciplinary, international, high-risk/high-reward, transformative and rapid-response Canadian-led research.

The local research projects are part of the international joint initiative's 32 international interdisciplinary research projects, involving 424 researchers from 45 countries.

These three-year projects focus on the design and implementation of adaptation and mitigation strategies for vulnerable groups.

These groups are currently the most impacted by climate change effects due to their physical and socio-economic vulnerability.

The research funders contributed a total of more than US\$30 million in additional funds to the research projects. NRF CEO, Dr Fulufhelo Nelwamondo, said the financial boost to the International Joint Initiative for Research in Climate Change Adaptation and Mitigation comes at an opportune time.

"Research projects under the initiative are starting to take shape. These include those that are funded by the NRF, which has made significant investments in the initiative. The funding will propel these research projects to greater heights."

In addition to the investment, the Canada Research Coordinating Committee also announced the NFRF Exploration Competition grantees.

Each year, the NFRF Exploration Competition supports research that brings various disciplines together in new ways and from bold, innovative perspectives.

Exploration grants support research with a range of impacts —economic, scientific, artistic, cultural, social, technological, environmental or health-related.

This year, US\$33 million was awarded to 133 research projects that focus on topics such as the exploration of the outer reaches of Earth's atmosphere and the cosmos from a high-arctic perspective, transforming artificial intelligence software concepts into smart mechanical systems, and using liquid biopsies to better detect breast cancer.

The International Joint Initiative for Research in Climate Change Adaptation and Mitigation requires that projects address at least two of the eight representative key risks identified in the sixth assessment report of the United Nations' Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.

The report highlights the unprecedented changes in the climate that are being observed in every region, affecting all ecosystems and societies, and that will continue to intensify with further warming. – Source: SAnews.gov.za

#### CELEBRATING WORLD ENVIRONMENT DAY

The Department of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment (DFFE) has called on all South Africans to join the international community in celebrating World Environment Day.

World Environment Day was celebrated under the theme Accelerating Land Restoration, Drought Resilience and Desertification Progress.

The theme highlights the importance of accelerating the implementation of interventions aimed at addressing land degradation, desertification and minimising the impacts of drought at all levels.

"As South Africans, we should combine local actions and land restoration techniques in the fight against land degradation, desertification and drought impacts. This includes planting trees, rotating crops, using water retention techniques, such as building retention ditches and cut-off drains, and applying organic manures and mineral fertilisers, among other methods," Minister of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment, Barbara Creecy, said on Wednesday, 5 June 2024.



Desertification is caused by multiple forces, including extreme weather conditions, particularly drought. It is also caused by human activities that pollute or degrade the quality of soil, negatively affecting land utility.

These include poor land use management and depletion of soil nutrients due to unsustainable agricultural practices; deforestation; pollution (including waste); wind and soil erosion; expansion of agricultural land; overgrazing by livestock; overextraction of natural resources; as well as mining activities that result in salination.

"Both desertification and land degradation are intricately linked to food and water security, poverty, urbanisation, climate change and biodiversity, and are therefore among the most critical environmental challenges," the department said.

The international community has pledged to restore one billion hectares of degraded land by 2030.

Land restoration is about creating sustainable livelihood opportunities for people, including small-scale farmers, indigenous peoples and local communities, businesses and entrepreneurs, women and youth, to boost incomes, secure food and water supplies, and make individuals and communities less vulnerable.

"Land restoration is a shared responsibility and everyone has a role to play. Let us strive to restore ecosystems, mitigate desertification and combat drought, thereby forging a path towards a greener, healthier and more prosperous planet for all," Minister Creecy said. – Source: SAnews.gov.za


#### SOUTH AFRICAN CREATIVE WINS PRESTIGIOUS PRIZE FOR VIVID VISUAL STORYTELLING

Lebohang Kganye has wowed the world with her visual storytelling talents, so much so that she won the 2024 Deutsche Börse Photography Foundation Prize as announced at London's Photographer's Gallery.

The prestigious award of GBP£30 000 commends her exhibition *Haufi nyana?* (I've come to take you home) as showcased at Amsterdam's Foam Museum.

Haufi nyana, which translates to "too close" from Sesotho, reflects on the concept of home, how far, close, or too close it may seem, "perhaps even simultaneously," says Kganye.

A collection of projects spanning years, the mixed means used in her visual storytelling include animations, photography, patchwork and local literature to help the onlooker think about the many factors that created their own micro-histories.



"The influential prize, which we present annually together with the Photographer's Gallery, rewards artists and their projects recognised as having made the most significant contribution to international contemporary photography over the past 12 months," shares the Foundation.

Kganye was shortlisted alongside other artists from around the world, each of whom took on visual storytelling projects that engaged with concerns ranging from heritage to equality and gender.

"Together, these artists demonstrate photography's unique capacity to reveal what is invisible, forgotten or marginalised and imagine a path to redress," the Foundation adds.

Kganye shares that Haufi nyana? I've come to take you home is largely for, and in a sense, from, her mother, Dimakatso.

"In 2010, her death prompted me to travel across South Africa to trace my maternal ancestry. The stories that I collected in conversations with my extended family became the source material for my work, an archive that I continue to draw upon today," she says, sharing that being raised by women like her mother, grandmother and aunts allowed her to see life through their eyes while being fuelled to see other ways of life and hear other stories."

"As an artist, I want my work to be a mirror for others, for them to see themselves reflected," she adds.

About her win, Kganye says:

"This yes counters all the no's, the maybe's, the unresolved projects that just needed more hands, patience and time to stop and start again, allowing for the magic to come through."

#### UNIVERSITY OF JOHANNESBURG'S ART GALLERY TO SPOTLIGHT AFRICAN SUPERHEROES

An exciting exhibition in Johannesburg is gearing up to reconnect young South Africans with our rainbow nation legacy as African superheroes are showcased and new possibilities are imagined.



Mainstream superheroes might have different backgrounds, varying superpowers and distinct personalities. But most tend to have one thing in common (that is, beyond being superheroes)—they rarely represent Africa or African stories. Where are the African superheroes beyond fictional places like Wakanda?

Challenging the Westernised idea of the superhero, the University of Johannesburg (UJ) Art Gallery is set to host *African Hero*—a creative effort to "Africanise the superhero aesthetic for local audiences", as UJ shares, all while spotlighting African-value-centric storytelling.

Not only is it a challenge for authentic representation, but it's also a pushback on

stereotypes that African characters get lumped with across genres. This matters as much as self-representation does.

Thanks to Rainbow Nation comics' Phemelo Dibodu and Omphile Dibodu (both of whom are UJ alumni), *African Hero* is coming to life. Through their work, the idea to change the narrative and ignite South African patriotism is underway, thanks to their protagonist, Young Nelson.

Using art and technology, a one-minute comic book trailer showcases Young Nelson—a way to reconnect, especially for the younger generation of South Africa, with our Rainbow Nation legacy.

"Young Nelson symbolises the youth of the South grappling with the modern-day challenges confronting the nation. He is a reminder that they are ambitious, resilient, tenacious, fearless and embody a spirit of unwavering determination," says UJ.

With efforts from Afro Geek (a community focused on empowerment through and for diversity led by Tapelo Zama and Neo Mothoagae), the spotlight also extends to African creators like award-winning comic book artist Bill Masuku and artist Trevor Ngwenya (Kubo Art).

#### SIYA KOLISI MAKES WAVES AT MONACO GRAND PRIX


Siya Kolisi, the revered South African rugby captain, brought his infectious energy to the Monaco Grand Prix as a guest of Red Bull Racing.

#### ERNIE ELS WINS PRINCIPAL CHARITY CLASSIC ON CHAMPIONS TOUR

South Africa's Ernie Els claimed a two-stroke victory in the Principal Charity Classic on the PGA Champions Tour on Sunday, 2 June 2024.



It was the fourth Champions Tour victory for Els, who closed with a seven-under 65 to finish on 21-under for the week. Canada's Stephen Ames was second on 19-under, with the trio of David Duval, Rod Pampling and Bernhard Langer tied for third on 17-under.

Els and Ames were tied for the lead after the second round, but as the Big Easy compiled five birdies and an eagle in a bogey-free final day, he was able to edge out his opponent.

It was Els' first win on the Champions Tour since March last year.

"It's very special," Els said. "You know, I haven't won for a while. I've had quite a few chances, but it gets tougher when you don't get it over the line. So today was very, very competitive. A lot of players, a lot of great players. I just took my chance when it came."

The 54-year-old Els remains the last South African player to have won a major when he claimed a shock win at The Open Championship at Royal Lytham and St Annes in 2012.

At the age of 42, it was Els' first major victory in 10 years. Between 1994 and 2002, Els won two US Open titles (1994, 1997) and The Open Championship (2002).

Els also reached world number one in 1998 and later finished second in The Masters in 2000 to Vijay Singh and again was runner-up at Augusta National in 2004 to Phil Mickelson. – Source: www.iol.co.za

#### IMPRESSIVE PROTEAS SEAL COMFORTABLE WIN OVER SRI LANKA IN T20 WORLD CUP OPENER

Sri Lanka's total was their lowest in all T20 cricket, with fast bowler Nortje's figures the best by a South African at a T20 World Cup, surpassing his own 4-10 against Bangladesh in Sydney two years ago.



Opener Kusal Mendis (19) and veteran allrounder Angelo Mathews (16) were the only Sri Lanka batsmen to pass 15 after their Captain, Wanindu Hasaranga, seemingly misread conditions by opting to bat first after winning the toss in what was the first match at a Long Island ground, built specially for this tournament.

But South Africa too lost early wickets in their chase as their top order also struggled to time the ball on a difficult pitch for batting. Klaasen was 19 not out as South Africa finished on 80-4 with 26 balls to spare.

South African fast bowler Ottneil Baartman, making his World Cup debut, sparked Sri

Lanka's collapse when, with his first ball, he had Pathum Nissanka caught in the deep before Nortje dismissed Kamindu Mendis in a similar fashion.

Maharaj then struck twice in the ninth over as both the advancing Hasaranga, stumped by De Kock and Sadeera Samarawickrama, clean bowled by a quicker delivery, fell for nought to leave Sri Lanka 32-4 before Charith Asalanka survived the hat-trick ball. Nortje returned to dismiss Mathews in his last over.

Sri Lanka were bowled out with five balls left when last man Nuwan Thushara was run out for one of four ducks in the innings. – Source: <a href="https://www.iol.co.za">www.iol.co.za</a>
