THE OATH HAS BEEN TAKEN, PRESIDENT RAMAPHOSA IS INAUGURATED

"In the presence of everyone assembled here, and in full realisation of the high calling I assume as President of the Republic of South Africa, I, Matamela Cyril Ramaphosa, swear that I will be faithful to the Republic of South Africa and will obey, observe, uphold and maintain the Constitution and all other law of the Republic.

"And I solemnly and sincerely promise that I will always promote all that will advance the Republic and oppose all that may harm it, protect and promote the rights of all South Africans, discharge my duties with all my strength and talents to the best of my knowledge and ability and true to the dictates of my conscience, do justice to all and devote myself to the wellbeing of the Republic and all its people, so help me God."



With that solemn oath, President Matamela Cyril Ramaphosa has taken his place in the highest office in the land – The Presidency of South Africa.

This is his second term as President.

The President was inaugurated and took the Oath of Office – administered by Chief Justice Raymond Zondo – at the Union Buildings on Wednesday, 19 June 2024.

This signalled the official start of the seventh administration of democratic South Africa.

Following the Oath of Office, the President turned to First Lady, Dr Tshepo Motsepe and gave her a peck of acknowledgement.

President Ramaphosa then received a congratulatory praise song by award winning praise singer, Ntombi Ya Mutsonga.

He then acknowledged the National Salute, the national anthem and the 21-gun salute.

The inauguration was attended by current and former heads of state and governments, royalty, high level dignitaries and ordinary South Africans. – Source: SAnews.gov.za

GOVERNMENT OF NATIONAL UNITY: A MOMENT OF PROFOUND SIGNIFICANCE



Wednesday, 19 June 2024 is by no means an ordinary day in the collective landscape of South Africa. With President Cyril Ramaphosa having taken his Oath of Office, marking the start of the seventh administration, the country is now firmly in the fold of the creation of a Government of National Unity.

The recently concluded 29 May National and Provincial Elections, while having been conducted in a manner that has been deemed free and fair by the South African Human Rights Commission, among others, demonstrated the maturity of South Africa's democracy since its early steps in 1994. Even though the outcomes of the first democratic election made clear the resounding message of the masses, who had long battled for the right of political and societal agency, a Government of National Unity was formed to help the fragile populace to navigate the treacherous waters of a nation that was new to inclusivity.

While this year's General Election results produced no outright majority winner, the requirement for leaders of different formations to work together is not too unsimilar to what the country had to do to find its way at the inception of democracy. Today, leaders are required to carve a new path, one where cooperation among parties with different views have come together, and continue to do so, united in the single purpose of providing citizens with services that are aimed at improving their quality of life and building a sense of national solidarity.

Addressing the public in his inaugural speech, and essentially the world at large who had been following developments in the country, President Ramaphosa on Wednesday said the formation of the Government of National Unity is a moment of profound significance.

"It is the beginning of a new era," President Ramaphosa said at the Union Buildings in Pretoria.

He said the Government of National Unity requires a common mission, which is anchored in safeguarding national unity, peace, stability, inclusive economic growth, non-racialism and non-sexism.

"Through the ballots that they have cast, the people of South Africa have made plain their expectation that the leaders of our country should work together."

President Ramaphosa said the people of South Africa have directed their representatives to put aside animosity and dissent, to abandon narrow interests and to pursue together only that which benefits the nation.

"As leaders, as political parties, we are called upon to work in partnership towards a growing economy, better jobs, safer communities and a government that works for its people."

President Ramaphosa said from across the political spectrum, parties have answered that call.

"Understanding that no party can govern alone and make laws alone, these parties have agreed to work in partnership, to employ their talents for the good of the country and the progress of its people.

"Together, they have resolved to establish a government of national unity to pursue a common programme of fundamental and lasting change. "As the leaders of this country came together in a Government of National Unity 30 years ago to forge a common future and build a united nation, the parties in the government of national unity of today have agreed to work together to address the most pressing challenges before our nation," President Ramaphosa said.

President Ramaphosa said the parties have adopted a Statement of Intent, in which they have committed to pursue rapid, inclusive and sustainable economic growth, to create a more just society by tackling poverty, to safeguard the rights of workers, to stabilise government and to build state capacity and to pursue a foreign policy based on human rights, solidarity and peace.

"As South Africans, we must each do what we can to achieve this mission. We will invite all parties, civil society, labour, business and other formations to a National Dialogue on the critical challenges facing the nation," the President said.

President Ramaphosa said the parties have made a commitment to invest in South Africa's people through quality education and health care, to address crime and corruption, to strengthen social cohesion and build a united nation and the will of the people shall be done without any doubt or question.

"The voters of South Africa did not give any single party the full mandate to govern our country alone.

"We will seek, as we have done at so many important moments in our history, to forge a social compact to realise the aspirations of our National Development Plan.

"As individuals, as families, as communities and in our many formations, let us draw on our every strength to turn our dream for a better South African into reality," President Ramaphosa said. – Source: SAnews.gov.za

YOUTH CHALLENGES TO REMAIN KEY UNDER GOVERNMENT OF NATIONAL UNITY

Deputy President Paul Mashatile has thrown his weight behind President-elect Cyril Ramaphosa, saying he is confident that under his leadership in the government of national unity, South Africa will continue to address the challenges facing the youth.

"In this regard, we will in the next five years, focus on creating jobs and building an inclusive and growing economy. We will equally focus on implementing a programme focused on skilling youth with the skills of the future," he said on Sunday, 16 June 2024.

Deputy President Mashatile was speaking at the 48th anniversary of Youth Day at the Old Peter Mokaba Stadium in Polokwane, Limpopo. The annual event recollected the sacrifices of South Africa's youth in the fight for democracy, an event immortalised by the Soweto Uprising of 16 June 1976.

"Our young people must have work opportunities," Deputy President Mashatile told the gathering.

The Deputy President believed that the recent general elections have once again demonstrated the country's dedication to the values and principles of democracy through free and fair elections.

He told the people who had filled the marquee that through their vote, they had spoken and given political parties a clear message after no party won an outright majority.

"You want us as political leaders to put our

differences aside and work together to build our country and address the challenges affecting our people. We are determined to put our differences aside and use our collective strength, skills and experience to create the South Africa that the fallen heroes of the 1976 uprising fought for."

He stated that young people make up more than two-thirds of the population, making them the biggest community in South Africa. "Therefore, we cannot move forward without them, without the youth of our country."

He cited the National Development Plan, which places youth at the heart of the country's development. He said their participation was critical to meeting growth targets.

The Deputy President also highlighted the importance of involving young people in South Africa's developmental initiatives to address challenges such as poverty, social inequality, poor mental health and high levels of unemployment.

Youth programmes

He acknowledged the challenges facing the National Student Financial Aid Scheme (NSFAS) and assured youngsters that they would ensure the scheme was administered efficiently.

He believes that NSFAS remains a critical vehicle that supports students from poor and working-class families, with over 70% of university and more than 90% of Technical Vocational Education and Training college students benefiting from the scheme.

"We must work together; the private sector, government and civil society, must work together to address these challenges."

The Deputy President also emphasised the need for a whole-of-society approach to provide young people with better access to quality education, basic skills and employment opportunities, especially those who live in rural areas.

Despite the country's challenging financial circumstances, he said the state continues to invest in youth human capital development, with more than R31.8 billion pumped into basic education in 2023 and R130.1 billion for post-secondary education training in 2022.

He touched on government's efforts to create opportunities for youth through programmes such as the National Youth Development Agency and Enterprise Development Programme.

"As the government, we want to see more young people actively involved in the economy and participating in decisions that affect their lives. "This time around, young people have a government that cares for, prioritises their needs and wants to see them succeed, unlike the government of 1976."

Government's comprehensive approach to reducing youth unemployment, he said, includes formal education, internships and assistance for youth entrepreneurship through the Presidential Youth Employment Intervention.

"Without the employment of young people, growth cannot occur. I am confident that the seventh administration will continue with efforts to position young people as essential drivers and beneficiaries of economic transformation."

The Deputy President also took the time to pay tribute to the fallen heroes and saluted the brave youth who fought for liberation.

"As we traverse the economic challenges, we urge the youth to adopt the same attitude as Hector Peterson, Mbuyisa Makhubo, Tsietsi Mashinini and all the youth of 1976, whose sacrifices gave birth to our political freedom. Their efforts have set us on the right path towards a South Africa that is non-racial, non-sexist and democratic."

Newly elected Limpopo Premier, Dr Phophi Ramathuba, has urged the youth to tackle the social ills that they are facing and grab every opportunity that comes their way.

She highlighted the need for innovative approaches, such as technology integration and equal access to quality education for all. Premier Ramathuba stressed the importance of addressing the current education system's inequalities and limitations to ensure a brighter future for South Africa. – Source: SAnews.gov.za

WILDLIFE FILMMAKER AND LOCAL RESERVE CELEBRATE WINNING TWO FILM FESTIVAL AWARDS

Filmmaker Andrew Barratt, Hungry Bison Films and Shamwari Game Reserve won two categories at the International Tourism Film Festival Africa.



Filmmaker Andrew Barratt, Hungry Bison Films and Shamwari Game Reserve have won two categories at the annual International Tourism Film Festival Africa (ITFFA) for the reserve's promotional video and a short documentary on the largest vulture relocation in Africa.

The team took the top awards for Tourism Video and Documentary, and TV and Web Programme—Wildlife Conservation, respectively.

The ITFFA was founded in 2019 and honours all video content related to the tourism and travel industry. Thanks to its strong tourism industry, South Africa often features at this festival. The ITFFA aims to recognise and promote works with exceptional and innovative content and contribute to stimulating the development and growth of the national and African audiovisual industry.

Wildlife filmmaker Andrew Barratt has been a long-time collaborator with the reserve and was one of the producers of the 13-series Netflix hit, *Shamwari Untamed*, which follows wildlife vet, Johan Joubert, and ecologist John O'Brien around the 250km² reserve as they manage the day-to-day. There are even hints of a second series coming.

Like many local game reserves, Andrew Barratt teamed up with Shamwari head ranger Andrew Kearney during the pandemic to start Shamwari TV. Channels like this became a lifeline for people stuck in their homes. Now, there are nearly 300 episodes with almost 40 000 people around the world tuning in.

Now, Andrew and the Shamwari team have two awards to show for their hard work. Barratt's award-winning documentary on Africa's largest vulture relocation tells the story of the first phase of a project to secure the future of wild vulture populations in southern Africa, with the establishment of VulPro@Shamwari.

It documents the largest relocation of vultures ever undertaken, with 160 Cape and African White-backed vultures transported 1 042km from Hartbeespoort to bespoke enclosures at Shamwari.

Barratt says while he's grateful for the accolades and recognition of his work, awards are not why he makes wildlife films.

"For me it's more about sharing my passion for the bush and wildlife and hopefully in the process getting more people to realise how precious these are and why it's essential we conserve our natural heritage. I've been very lucky to have been able to work with Shamwari, which shares this ethos." – Source: <u>www.goodthingsguy.com</u>

SAA NAMED OFFICIAL CARRIER FOR SOUTH AFRICAN NATIONAL FOOTBALL TEAMS

South African Airways (SAA) has partnered with the South African Football Association (SAFA) to be the official carrier for South Africa's national football teams, Bafana Bafana and Banyana Banyana.

According to *Travel News*, the new partnership took effect from 1 June and will see SAA transport the national teams to their upcoming destinations for their international matches.

Professor John Lamola, Interim CEO of SAA said that they looked to the new partnership.

"We welcome our national teams on board and we look forward to flying them around the world on national duty to represent our nation. We know the players and officials will be well taken care of and will enjoy our award-winning hospitality that SAA is renowned for," Lamola said as per *Travel News*.

In other recent SAA news, the airlines successful launch of flights between São Paulo and both Cape Town and Johannesburg in



October and November last year saw arrivals from South America significantly increased since take off.

As per *Tourism Update*, South African Airways Spokesperson, Khaya Buthelezi said that around 16 800 passengers had made their way to and from Brazil during the first 90 days of the airline operating the new route.

"According to the tourism authorities in the Western Cape, for the first three months following the inaugural flight from Cape Town, there has been a 370% increase in two-way passenger traffic between Cape Town and Brazil. These numbers speak volumes regarding the latent demand between the two destinations," Buthelezi said as per *Tourism Update*.

TRAILBLAZING SOUTH AFRICAN SCHOOL SHORTLISTED FOR WORLD'S BEST SCHOOL PRIZES 2024

An inspirational South African school has been named in the Top 10 shortlist for the World's Best School Prizes 2024. The five World's Best School Prizes, founded by T4 Education in collaboration with Accenture, American Express and the Lemann Foundation, are the world's most prestigious education prizes and this year's winners will share a US\$50 000 prize fund.



Christel House South Africa, an independent kindergarten through secondary school in Cape Town, South Africa, provides free character-based, career-focused education to children from severely under-resourced communities in Cape Town. It has been named in the Top 10 shortlist for the World's Best School Prize for Overcoming Adversity.

The five World's Best School Prize —for Community Collaboration, Environmental Action, Innovation, Overcoming Adversity and Supporting Healthy Lives were established in the wake of COVID-19 in 2022 to give a platform to schools that are changing lives in their classrooms and far beyond their walls, sharing their best practices to help improve education everywhere.

The winners of the five prizes will be chosen by an expert judging academy based on rigorous criteria. In addition, all 50 shortlisted schools across the five prizes will also take part in a public vote, which opened today.

The school that receives the most public votes will receive the Community Choice Award and membership to T4 Education's Best School to Work programme to help them support teacher wellbeing and solve the teacher recruitment and retention crisis.

Vikas Pota, Founder of T4 Education and the World's Best School Prizes, said: "Unless we solve the urgent challenges global education faces — from learning gaps exacerbated by COVID-19 to chronic underfunding and the growing teacher wellbeing, recruitment and retention crisis —we will have failed the next generation.

"Trailblazing South African schools like Christel House South Africa, which have cultivated a strong culture and aren't afraid to innovate and show the difference that can be made to so many lives. Schools everywhere can now learn from their solutions, and it's time governments do so as well."

The top three finalists for each of the five World's Best School Prizes will be announced in September 2024, followed by the winners in November. The winner of each prize will be chosen based on rigorous criteria by a judging academy comprising distinguished leaders across the globe, including academics, educators, NGOs, social entrepreneurs, government, civil society and the private sector.

A prize of US\$50 000 will be equally shared among the winners of the five prizes, with each receiving an award of US\$10 000. Meanwhile, the winner of the Community Choice Award, as determined by the public vote, will receive membership to Best School to Work, which is an independent, evidence-based mechanism to certify schools for their culture and working environment. BOTANICAL ARTIST WINS GOLD FOR SA FOR FLORAL WONDERS

Hot on the heels of South Africa's winning display at the Chelsea Flower Show, Daleen Roodt achieved another floral feat after she won the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) gold and Best Artwork on show at the RHS Botanical Art Show.



While floral artist Leon Kluge led South Africa's golden return to the world-famous floral stage after a lengthy hiatus, botanical artist Daleen Roodt (37) added another gold medal to South Africa's tally in addition to winning Best Artwork on Show at the RHS Botanical Art Show.

The show, held at the Saatchi Gallery in London, is the most prestigious exhibition of botanical art in the world.

There, artists must exhibit six top-class artworks under a theme. The artwork is then judged by an expert panel of seven professionals. But all this only comes after artists are approved to participate in the event in the first place—a highly selective process that's followed by a fiveyear period in which the artists are given to prepare the works they'll present.

The artworks are then judged based on criteria of botanical accuracy, technical skill and exact colour reproduction. Not to mention attention to detail and aesthetic appeal.

Of course, loads of work went into the South African botanical artist's blossoming moment. After being awarded the Dawn Jolliffe Botanical Art Bursary by the RHS Bursaries Committee in support of her project, over a period of three flowering seasons, Roodt studied indigenous orchids and their pollinators across South Africa, in their natural environments.

It took many days and hours of fieldwork across three different provinces on top of almost 1200 hours to complete her watercolour paintings. Her massive orchid painting took 360 hours to complete.

Taking all of this into account makes Roodt's success that much more impressive, in addition to the fact that she was the only South African artist who participated.

She received a RHS Gold Medal and was awarded Best Artwork on Show for her larger-than-life orchid painting at the RHS Botanical Art Show in London—a fantastic floral feat. SOUTH AFRICAN ATHLETE SINGS CARL LEWIS'S PRAISES FOR RECORD-BREAKING SPRINT

South African track and field athlete Shaun Maswanganyi is reaching greater heights in his career after he cracked a new sprint record in the United States (US), something he largely attributes to his legendary mentor, the American Olympic champion, Carl Lewis.

Clocking in with a time of 20.41 at an indoor track and field meet in Texas, the young runner has shown that he has more than "potential" and a hunger to succeed.

When it comes down to it, though, good mentorship also forms an integral part of achievements like this and Maswanganyi has that, thanks to his coach and mentor. Winning nine Olympic gold medals in a career spanning from 1979 to 1996, Lewis made history and is generally regarded as one of the best athletes of all time.

The young athlete reflected on his recent record as a "work in progress" as he was not accustomed to running indoors in South Africa.

"It's not as easy as it may sound because there's a lot of technicalities when it comes to indoor racing and you've got to run the race more to gain experience," he reflected. But, with determination fuelling him, he ended up reaching his goal.



"We just tried to become more technical with the 200-metres indoors, and in doing so, I was able to go out there and execute. Overall, I am grateful for my coach and I'm grateful for the consistency, everything comes in due time."- Shaun Maswanganyi.

On being coached by Lewis

Maswanganyi reflected on having Lewis as his guide and how much that has helped with his performance, sharing: "To have Carl Lewis as a coach is definitely special. I speak about it all the time, he's more than just a coach to me. He's more than a mentor. He's a father figure in many aspects," he told SportsBoom.com.

The athlete heaped loads of adoration for Lewis, showing appreciation for the fact that their relationship doesn't end after practice sessions, but rather that he is someone Maswanganyi feels he can lean on, even outside of the sport.

"He's always there for me and at the end of the day, he's done everything that I probably aspire to do in athletics, so he's the man for the job and I'm just grateful to have him in my life and I just pray that our relationship just keeps getting stronger and stronger and he keeps being my mentor on and off the track," Maswanganyi adds.

On the upcoming 2024 Olympic Games

JOHANNESBURG TO HOST 2025 AFCON QUALIFYING DRAW

Johannesburg will host the 2025 Africa Cup of Nations qualifying draw on 4 July 2024, the Confederation of African Football (CAF) announced on Thursday, 13 June 2024.

Title-holders lvory Coast and tournament hosts Morocco are among 48 countries to be divided into 12 groups of four, with the winners and runnersup in 11 advancing to the 24-team finals.

Morocco is guaranteed a finals-place as host but will take part to gain competitive match practice. This means just one of the other teams in their mini-league will qualify.

Double qualifying matchdays are scheduled for 2 to 10 September, 7 to 15 October and 11 to 19 November this year.



The nations ranked one to 44 automatically qualified for the draw. Chad, Eswatini, Liberia and South Sudan won play-offs.

Originally scheduled for June to July 2025, the Cup of Nations is expected to be played later as the dates clash with the inaugural Club World Cup in the United States.

"Discussions (regarding dates) are well advanced with the stakeholders," CAF secretary-general Veron Mosengo-Omba, adding that a decision would be announced "soon".

Shifting the tournament to the beginning of 2026 "is in the air, but there is nothing official", said a CAF source.

While other continental championships are held every four years, the Cup of Nations is a two-yearly event as it provides most of the CAF income through television rights and advertising.

Plans to stage it in mid-year to avoid a clash with the European club season began in 2019, when Egypt played host in searing heat.

Fears that torrential seasonal rain could disrupt subsequent editions in Cameroon and the Ivory Coast led to January to February tournaments. Stars like prolific Liverpool scorer Mohamed Salah had to leave European clubs in mid-season, and a hamstring injury during the group phase of the 2024 tournament lengthened his absence. – Source: <u>www.iol.co.za</u>
