

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PRESIDENT RAMAPHOSA TO OFFICIATE FIRST MEETING OF G20 FOREIGN MINISTERS UNDER THE SOUTH AFRICAN PRESIDENCY

President Cyril Ramaphosa on Thursday, 20 February 2025, officially opened and addressed the Group of Twenty (G20) Foreign Ministers' Meeting in Johannesburg.

The Foreign Ministers' Meeting hosted by Minister of International Relations and Cooperation, Minister Ronald Lamola, takes place under South Africa's G20 Presidency theme of *Solidarity, Equality, Sustainability* on 20 and 21 February 2025 at the Nasrec Expo Centre.

South Africa's G20 Presidency commenced in December 2024, and South Africa will, during the course of 2025, host approximately 130 Working Group meetings and 23 meetings at ministerial level.

The year-long deliberations will culminate in a G20 Leaders' Summit in November 2025.



The G20 Foreign Ministers' Meeting will, over two days of plenary sessions, discuss issues including current global geopolitical dynamics and reflect on South Africa's G20 Presidency High-Level Deliverables and the Review of the G20@20, which examines the impact of the G20 during the two decades of its existence.

G20 summits of heads of state and government bring together leaders from the world's largest economies to address pressing global challenges and foster economic cooperation.

Since its inception in 2008, the G20 has evolved from a crisis-management platform to a broader forum tackling issues like financial stability, climate change, sustainable development, and global health.

During its presidency, South Africa is prioritising Africa's development and the goals outlined in the African Union Agenda 2063: The Africa We Want.

South Africa's three priorities for the G20 Presidency focus on:

- Inclusive Economic Growth, Industrialisation, Employment and Reduce Inequality
- Food Security
- Artificial Intelligence, Data Governance and Innovation for Sustainable Development.

PRESIDENT RAMAPHOSA CONCLUDES OFFICIAL VISIT TO ETHIOPIA FOR 38TH AU SUMMIT

President Cyril Ramaphosa on Saturday, 15 February 2025, concluded his visit to Ethiopia, where he participated in the 38th Ordinary Session of the Heads of State and Government of the African Union (AU).

The Assembly was held under the theme Justice for Africans and People of African Descent through Reparations from 15 to 16 February 2025.

The 38th Ordinary Session of the Heads of State and Government of the African Union (AU) was organised by the African Union Commission (AUC).

The opening ceremony of the AU Summit was held with the attendance of AUC leaders, officials, ministers, ambassadors from AU Member States, representatives of AU organs and offices, as well as partners.

President Ramaphosa congratulated the newly elected Chairperson Mahmoud Ali Yousouf and Deputy Chairperson Ambassador Salma Malika Haddadi, who will lead the AU during the next four years.

The Assembly also appointed new commissioners who will work as a collective in realising the aspirations of the continent and its people.



"South Africa congratulates the new leadership cohort of the union and is especially proud of Lerato Mataboge as the new Commissioner for Infrastructure and Energy," The Presidency said in a statement.

SAnews reported that Mataboge has been elected as the Commissioner for Infrastructure and Energy of the AU after her name was put forward by the South African Government.

She holds a BA Honours in Law and International Relations from the University of Witwatersrand, a Master's Degree in International Political Economy from the University of Warwick, as well as a qualification in Infrastructure in Market Economy from the Harvard Kennedy School Executive Education.

Mataboge has since committed to providing credible responses to new technologies, including biotechnologies, digitisation, and artificial intelligence, while acknowledging Africa's vital mineral resources in developing global technologies.

The Assembly further deliberated on the state of peace and security in Africa.

"It expressed grave concern for the evolving situation in the eastern DRC [Democratic Republic of the Congo]. The Heads of State called upon the M23 to cease fire to prevent additional loss of lives. The Assembly reaffirmed the urgent need for inclusive negotiations and political dialogue as the only solution to end conflicts on the continent."

The leaders also took note of South Africa's Presidency of the G20 and congratulated South Africa for being the first African country to host this important gathering.

They expressed their support for the successful G20 Leaders' Summit scheduled to take place later this year in Johannesburg.

According to the President's Office, the country's Commander-in-Chief also had bilateral meetings with a few countries on the continent to exchange views on issues of mutual concern.

The Assembly also discussed the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA), activities of the Africa Centre for Disease Control, infrastructure development, and institutional reforms, among other matters.

FALLEN SOLDIERS PAID THE ULTIMATE PRICE



President Cyril Ramaphosa has described the 14 South African National Defence Force (SANDF) fallen soldiers as gallant heroes who "made the ultimate sacrifice so others may live in peace."

"Thank you for your sacrifice that others may be free. You died on the battlefield, far from all you held dear. But you are home now. You have come to your resting place. We are here to receive you with open arms and to lay you to rest," the President said.

This as the President and Chief of the SANDF, General Rudzani Maphwanya, led the transfer ceremony and memorial service for the troops killed in the eastern Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC) at Swartkop Air Force Base in Tshwane.

Thursday's (13 February 2025) emotionally charged events saw the weather mirror the sombre mood as rain fell while the mortal remains of the soldiers were ushered in, offering a poignant backdrop to a painful moment for the nation.

The families of the deceased found some solace in receiving the remains of their loved ones as, addressing them and the nation, President Ramaphosa assured them that their sons had not died in vain.

"To the families gathered here, we thank you for your sacrifice, for you have made the ultimate sacrifice as well by letting this country have your sons so they can serve the cause of peace on our continent.

"And I thank you as a Commander in Chief of [the] Armed Forces because they have paid the ultimate price. We as South Africans join you in your grief as you feel pain as a result of your loss so overwhelming. As a nation, we will forever be thankful to you as individual families for the sacrifice you have made. We will give them the honours that they deserve."

Duty

The fallen soldiers had been deployed as part of South Africa's commitment to peacekeeping efforts in the DRC under the Southern African Development Community (SADC) mission. Their mission was to protect the defenceless and contribute to the vision of a conflict-free Africa.

"Our nation is in mourning for these brave souls who lost their lives in defence of our brothers and sisters in the eastern DRC. They lost their lives in the name of duty, in pursuit of peace, and in the cause of silencing the guns across our beloved continent," President Ramaphosa said.

The President also extended condolences to the families of the soldiers from Tanzania and Malawi who perished in the same mission, thanking the Ugandan government and SADC partners for their support in bringing back the nation's fallen heroes.

A nation in grief

Delivering his tribute, General Maphwanya expressed disappointment at the discourse surrounding SANDF's deployment, urging South Africans to respect the sacrifice of those who had perished.

"As South Africans, we sometimes behave as if we enjoy inflicting pain on ourselves. A nation in grief for their fallen heroes should not be throwing accusations and counter-accusations about the merits and demerits of our deployment," he said.

He also addressed the ongoing discussions about defence funding, arguing that while the issue remains pressing, it should not overshadow the moment of grief.

"Our fallen heroes would be asking if it is the right time to open a debate on defence funding. We have stated, without shame, that a drastic injection is required to build capacity in the SANDF, but these are interactions that we make with those who are supposed to listen to us," he said.

Maphwanya added that "we should not be politicising this matter, saying the SANDF could have done better. Our people were armed, resourced, and capable of meeting the challenge they faced."

President Ramaphosa also echoed General Maphwanya's concerns over the politicisation of the soldiers' deaths, calling for a moment of unity and respect.

"He is decrying the politicisation of this whole mission and indeed the politicisation of the lives of our soldiers. His call is a correct one. This is not a time to be debating all the matters that have been current in our media but a time to mourn the death of our fallen soldiers," he asserted.

Bravery

General Maphwanya paid tribute to the courage of the soldiers, stating that they had marched into the heart of darkness with unwavering resolve.

"Each member of the SANDF who answered the call to serve in the DRC carried out the mission with the spirit of selflessness and sacrifice. They fought gallantly against the M23 rebels who threatened the fragile peace, embodying the essence of what it means to be a defender of freedom," he said.

Turning to the grieving families, he reassured them that their loved ones bravery would never be forgotten.

"I want you to know that your loved ones served with unwavering bravery and looked death in the face. They challenged what seemed like a daunting task that many wouldn't have liked to face, and yet they persevered. Their commendable conduct personified the spirit of resilience, demonstrating a level of commitment that inspires us all. They did not back down in the face of adversity; instead, they rose to the occasion," he said.

Heroes

As the military planes stood silent on the tarmac and soldiers saluted their fallen comrades one last time, the weight of their sacrifice was felt.

"To the families, we say, take comfort that they were heroes. Their work in the DRC was not just about maintaining order; it was about building bridges, fostering understanding, and creating pathways to lasting peace," President Ramaphosa stated.

Quoting the poet S.E.K Mqhayi, the President offered words of comfort.

"Be consoled, all you orphans. Be consoled, all you widows. Somebody has to die, so that something can be built. Somebody has to serve, so that others can live."

As South Africa bowed its head in collective mourning, the President reaffirmed the nation's commitment to peace, stability, and honouring the memory of those who had paid the ultimate price.

Stabilising the continent

The President emphasised that the country has a long-standing history of participating in peacekeeping missions, proving its dedication to stability on the continent.

Despite the sacrifices made, including the loss of soldiers, South Africa remains steadfast in its mission to build and maintain peace.

"As South Africa, we will not weaken in our resolve to realise the vision of an Africa free from war and conflict; an Africa free of poverty and underdevelopment; and an Africa at peace with itself and the world.

"The achievement of this vision is the most fitting tribute we can pay to our fallen heroes and the greatest honour to their memory. We will not forget them. These are the sons of our African soil, and these are the honoured heroes of our country," President Ramaphosa said. – Source: SAnews.gov.za

JOINT PRESS RELEASE: 16TH SOUTH AFRICA-EUROPEAN UNION MINISTERIAL POLITICAL DIALOGUE, 19 FEBRUARY 2025

The Minister of International Relations and Cooperation, Ronald Lamola, co-chaired the 16th Ministerial Political Dialogue (MPD) between South Africa and the European Union (EU) on Wednesday, 19 February 2025 in Cape Town. Minister Lamola was joined by Kaja Kallas, the EU High Representative for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy and Vice President of the European Commission in the context of the South Africa-EU Strategic Partnership.

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The meeting was also attended by Parks Tau, Minister of Trade, Industry and Competition; John Steenhuisen, South African Minister of Agriculture; Siviwe Gwarube, South African Minister of Basic Education; and Dr Blade Nzimande, South African Minister of Science, Technology and Innovation. The High Representative's three-day visit to Africa at the beginning of her mandate signals the EU's commitment to the partnership with South Africa and with the continent.



The EU-South Africa Ministerial Political Dialogue builds on the joint aspiration to further the strategic partnership, which has grown in depth and ambition over the years. The political and security cooperation is strong, and so are trade and investment relations: South Africa is EU's largest trading partner in sub-Saharan Africa, and the EU is South Africa's first trade and investment partner.

The Ministerial Political Dialogue is a key milestone ahead of the Eighth EU-South Africa Summit, which is scheduled for 13 March 2025. The political engagements between South Africa and the EU contribute to the celebration of the 25th anniversary of the European Union's partnership with Africa. In this context, both sides underscored the importance of holding the European Union-African Union Ministerial Meeting and Summit in 2025.

The Ministerial Political Dialogue presented an opportunity for the EU and South Africa to reiterate their common commitment to multilateralism, a consistent approach to the rules-based international order, and the centrality of the United Nations (UN) Charter. The parties further agreed on the need to reform the UN Security Council, recognising the urgent need to make it more representative, inclusive, transparent, efficient, democratic, and accountable.

Both sides affirmed their unwavering commitment to act in accordance with international law, including UN Charter and its purposes and principles. Both sides noted with distress the immense human suffering and the adverse impact of wars and conflicts around the world. Both sides reaffirmed that all states must act in a manner consistent with the purposes and principles of the UN Charter in its entirety. In line with the UN Charter, all states must refrain from the threat or use of force to seek territorial acquisition against the territorial integrity and sovereignty or political independence of any state and affirm that all parties in conflicts must comply with their obligations under international law, including international humanitarian law and international human rights law. Both sides further agreed that, guided by these principles, they would support efforts towards a just peace in Ukraine, Occupied Palestinian Territory, Sudan, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, and other major conflicts around the globe.

South Africa and the EU also discussed their cooperation in multilateral and regional fora, focusing in particular on their joint efforts to promote human rights and sustainable development and to address climate change. The EU emphasised its alignment with, and support for South Africa's G20's presidency priorities.

In view of the summit, South Africa and the EU also looked at their economic, trade, and investment agenda, including outstanding issues on both sides. Underlining the importance of a just energy transition, the EU and South Africa reviewed opportunities to step up cooperation on sustainable value chains, including critical raw materials with a view to further their respective competitiveness, economic security and decarbonisation efforts. The parties agreed that critical minerals have emerged as a pivotal topic on the global stage, reflecting a critical role in driving industrialisation, technological innovation, and inclusive economic growth. South Africa underscored the need for the transition to a low carbon economy to be just, enhance energy security and create jobs. The two sides acknowledged the role of regulatory cooperation, investment facilitation, as well as of businesses in driving these initiatives. South Africa and the EU further welcomed the robust collaboration in the areas of education, research and innovation. Both sides discussed opportunities to further enhance cooperation on open science and nuclear medical applications, to ensure progress on South Africa joining the Clean Hydrogen Mission of Mission Innovation, to broaden the participation of South Africa in the EU Framework Programme for Research and Innovation (R&I) Horizon Europe and in the Marie Skłodowska-Curie Actions, as well as to promote mobility and cooperation through Erasmus+.

It was agreed that international trade is an important engine for inclusive economic growth, combating poverty and hunger, and promoting sustainable development and the Sustainable Development Goals. South Africa and the EU also stressed that for trade and investment to act as a driver of global growth, well-being and prosperity, a transparent rules-based multilateral trading system, that is non-discriminatory, fair, open, inclusive, equitable, and sustainable is a necessity. SOUTH AFRICA ELECTED CHAIR OF AFRICAN REGIONAL LABOUR ADMINISTRATION CENTRE GOVERNING COUNCIL

The Ministry of Employment and Labour has welcomed the election of South Africa as the chair of the African Regional Labour Administration Centre (ARLAC) Governing Council for the 2025–2027 term of office.

The Minister of Employment and Labour, Nomakhosazana Meth, will serve as the chair of the ARLAC Governing Council following the election of South Africa at the 51st Governing Council meeting held in Lusaka, Zambia, from 10 to 14 February 2025.

The Minister was represented at the summit by Deputy Minister Judith Nemadzinga-Tshabalala, who successfully led the South African delegation.

The ARLAC is a regional institution with a mandate to strengthen labour administration systems in Africa through training, research, and consultancy advisory services. It was established in 1974 by the International Labour Organisation and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP).

"We welcome the election of South Africa by member countries and wish to thank the outgoing chair of the Governing Council, Minister E. Moyo from Zimbabwe, and wish him well in his endeavours. We wish to also extend sincere gratitude to the government of Zambia for their warm welcome and hospitality," Minister Meth said.

Vice-President Mutale Nalumango of the Republic of Zambia was the guest speaker during the meeting of the Governing Council, and she emphasised the importance of fair employment and tackling informal employment.



The Governing Council meeting was preceded by a High-Level Ministerial Symposium on 12 February 2025, which featured a presentation by the International Labour Organisation (ILO) under the theme: "Innovative Approaches to Tackling Informality and Promoting Transition towards Formality to Promote Decent Work", which is linked to Sustainable Development Goal 8 (SDG8) on "Decent Work and Economic Growth".

The meeting focused on the importance of formalising informal work and the need to establish a legislative and policy framework to ensure the realisation of decent work on the African continent.

South Africa will also serve alongside four vice-chairs: Sierra Leone, Malawi, Sudan, and Zimbabwe.

Additionally, South Africa also serves in the Committee of Senior Officials, together with other officials from Zimbabwe, Sudan, Zambia, and Sierra Leone. The committee is tasked with overseeing governance, policy implementation, and programming, and meets four times a year to report to the Governing Council.

The outcomes of the 51st ARLAC Governing Council meeting and High-Level Ministerial Symposium reflect South Africa's continued commitment to promoting decent work, social dialogue, and regional cooperation within the ARLAC community.

The next Governing Council meeting is scheduled to take place on the sidelines of the International Labour Conference in Geneva, Switzerland, in June 2025.

"The Department of Employment and Labour welcomes the election of South Africa as chair of the ARLAC Governing Council, which is an important institution with a mandate to provide training for labour administrators, and the provision of consultancy and advisory service aimed at strengthening labour administration systems in member countries.

"This is a very proud moment for the country, as Minister Nomakhosazana Meth assumes the chair of the ARLAC Governing Council. SA AGULHAS // CONCLUDES ANNUAL RESEARCH VOYAGE TO ANTARCTICA

South Africa's iconic supply and research vessel, the "SA Agulhas II" has berthed in Cape Town, following two months in Antarctica for its annual supply and research voyage.

"As we welcome the *SA Agulhas II* to Cape Town, we celebrate its role as a platform for discovery, collaboration, and commitment to sustainability. Together, we continue to position South Africa as a global leader in environmental science and conservation, ensuring a healthier planet for future generations," Minister of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment Dr Dion George said on Monday, 17 February 2025.

Cape Town is the home port of the SA Agulhas II. Commissioned in 2012, the SA Agulhas II, is a cutting-edge polar research vessel equipped with advanced laboratories, state-of-the-art scientific instrumentation, and facilities for training marine cadets.



"Returning from its annual Antarctic relief voyage, the ship plays a pivotal role in enabling research missions to and Antarctica the Southern Ocean, contributing significantly studying climate to systems. biodiversity. and oceanography.

"The vessel facilitates groundbreaking research and strengthens South Africa's contributions to qlobal scientific initiatives and environmental sustainability," the Department of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment (DFFE) said.

En route back, the vessel docked in East London for a public Open Day and a demonstration cruise for members of parliament, stakeholders, and the media from 14 to 17 February 2025 at the Port of East London in the Eastern Cape.

Minister George acknowledged the important role played by the crew that took the vessel to Antarctica and back.

"To the crew of the SA Agulhas II, the scientists, and the experts on board, we commend your dedication and expertise. Your work in extreme environments is a testament to South Africa's resilience, innovation, and leadership in environmental science," he said.

The schools' Open Day on Friday, 14 February 2025, saw more than 1 000 learners drawn from schools across the Buffalo City Metro experience the wonders of marine science and gain firsthand insights into the operations of this ice breaker.

"This initiative highlights our ongoing commitment to education and capacity building, inspiring the next generation of scientists, explorers, and environmental custodians," Minister George said.

During the public Open Day on Saturday, 15 February 2025, over 3 000 attendees engaged with exhibitions hosted by the department and its partners.

Visitors had the unique opportunity to tour the vessel, interact with experts, and learn about the groundbreaking research taking place in the Southern Ocean and Antarctica.

These engagements not only underscored the significance of the work done but also reinforced the vital role these regions play in shaping our shared environmental future.

"We extend our heartfelt appreciation to Deputy Minister Narend Singh for his outstanding leadership throughout the school's programme, the SA Agulhas II Open Day, and the demonstration cruise to Cape Town.

"His unwavering commitment to engaging with stakeholders and the public has been invaluable. HOME AFFAIRS LAUNCHES NEW TOURISM PROGRAMME FOR CHINA AND INDIA

The Department of Home Affairs officially launched its new Trusted Tour Operator Scheme.



Phase one of the Department of Home Affairs' new visa programme, which was announced last September, officially went live on Wednesday, 12 February 2025. The Trusted Tour Operator Scheme (TTOS) will now make it easier for selected tour operators from China and India to obtain visas for tourists who wish to visit South Africa.

According to *Tourism Update*, the TTOS addresses an ongoing obstacle to tourism growth from these nations due to long queues, red tape, and not being able to process group applications timeously.

Before the TTOS was established, there were only two South African missions in China and only two in India. These were expected to serve the 2.8 billion people living in those countries who wished to visit South Africa.

Now, under the new TTOS digital-first system, tourists from both these countries using approved tour operators will not have to visit a mission, fill in a form, or stand in a long queue for visas. They will instead receive their visas digitally within three days.

"The fact that Home Affairs took the TTOS from conceptualisation to implementation in less than six months demonstrates our commitment to embracing digital transformation and to playing our role as an economic enabler to create jobs." Minister of Home Affairs, Dr Leon Schreiber, said.

A boost for the economy

Minister Schreiber also said that the TTOS was only the start of Home Affairs' embrace of their role as an economic enabler.

"Research indicates that boosting tourism by only 10% per year can boost annual economic growth by 0.6% and create tens of thousands of new jobs for South Africans. Travelling in large groups is the preferred option for many tourists from some countries, and it is time for our visa system to adapt in order to reflect and capitalise on this reality." he said when the visa scheme was announced.

"Exciting as it is, TTOS is itself but an interim measure to boost tourism while we move with speed to digitally transform Home Affairs. Ultimately, our vision is for a fully automated process that delivers secure tourist visa outcomes digitally and within seconds to tourists from around the world." Brown currently supports four Grade 10 learners from Daliwonga Senior Secondary School in Cofimvaba who have come through Tangible Africa's coding club in Tsomo; four Grade 10 learners at Alexander Road High School in Gqeberha who have come through Tangible Africa's coding clubs in the city; two second-year and two first-year students doing Computing Sciences degrees at Nelson Mandela University, as well as a PhD researcher who is investigating the impact of unplugged coding on primary school Mathematics.

Seattle-based Brown, an Alexander Road High School alumnus and BCom Honours graduate from Nelson Mandela University, is a long-time supporter of Tangible Africa.

"Tangible Africa is one of the groundbreaking initiatives pioneered by The Leva Foundation. I have personally witnessed the impact of this programme, which has enabled us to identify naturally gifted young programmers among students who might otherwise never have discovered their talent. It is an honour to be able to contribute to some of their sponsorships, opening pathways to university degrees and careers in technology," said Brown.

Kieran White, a student in Computer Sciences at Nelson Mandela University, said the impact of the bursary is immeasurable. "David has changed my life in ways I can't describe, and I can't imagine where I would be right now if he had not offered to sponsor my studies. He isn't just a silent figure in the background, though. He takes an active part in ensuring that I am coping with my studies and life in general. He does this by regularly checking up on me and providing assistance where he can. He is truly an incredible man and role model to me," said White.

John Emery received funding to study BSc Computer Sciences at Nelson Mandela University this year and is excited to start his studies.

"The financial relief [of the bursary] is massive and the burden of me studying further has been lifted. I'm incredibly grateful to be given the opportunity to better myself. On a personal level, the understanding, compassion, and commitment shown by Mr Brown and the Leva Foundation has had a huge impact on me. It has shown me that faith, hope, and trust do exist. And that exceptional people of value do exist. I hope that in some manner I can 'pay this forward' one day," said Emery.

Corban Olivier, a BCom student in Computer Sciences and Information Systems, also wants to pay it forward one day:

"Having been introduced to Tangible Africa's coding games in Grade 9 sparked my interest in coding. I am grateful for the bursary as it affords me the opportunity to merge my interests in Business and Computer Sciences. The scholarship also allows me to meet other people who are passionate about making an impact on their communities through Computer Sciences," said Olivier.

In Tsomo in the rural Eastern Cape, Tangible Africa's Future Skills Programme Coordinator Lusanda Maqungo reports that the four Grade 10 learners who had been part of the Tsomo Academy since Grade 6, will again this year receive tutoring and mentorship in Mathematics, Coding and Robotics, and English.

"This support gives them a strong foundation. Thanks to the investment and guidance of the David Brown bursary scheme, these learners have emerged as promising young scholars with bright futures in STEM fields," said Maqungo.

Leva Foundation CEO Ryan le Roux was also grateful to Brown for investing in the Eastern Cape's talented youth.

SOUTH AFRICAN SPRINT LEGEND AKANI SIMBINE MAKES SOLID START TO INDOOR CIRCUIT IN BERLIN

It's not often that you see Akani Simbine running in February, but they say 2025 should be viewed as 20 20 THRIVE– and that is what the South African sprinting legend is trying to do by running on the indoor circuit for the first time.



The 31-year-old Olympic silver medallist—from last year's Paris Games in the 4x100m relay began his journey to September's world athletics championships in Tokyo by participating in the ISTAF World Indoor Tour meeting in Berlin on Friday night, 14 February 2025.

Simbine lined up in the 60m dash, where his outdoor personal best is 6.53 seconds. At least the indoor meetings allow for a heat and final for the sprinters, which made Simbine's trip to the German capital more worthwhile. He emerged victorious in his heat in front of a packed 12 000-capacity crowd at the Mercedes-Benz Arena.

Simbine stopped the clock in 6.63 seconds to edge out Nigeria's Folawiyo Olaoye, who was awarded the same time, while Germany's Lucas Ansah-Peprah finished third in 6.65.

Another German, Heiko Gussmann, won the second heat in a quick 6.57 and entered the final as the favourite.

Despite Simbine's best efforts, Gussmann clinched the final in the same 6.57 time, which the South African was also awarded to claim second spot, while Kevin Kranz of Germany was third in 6.61.

The most notable performance on the night came from pole vault superstar Armand Duplantis, who set a new meeting record of 6.10, which was also a world lead for 2025.

But for Simbine—who finished fourth in the 100m final at the Paris Olympics—the cobwebs of the pre-season training has now been removed, and he will hope to quicken up over the next few weeks ahead of the world indoor championships, which will take place at the Nanjing Sports Training Centre in China from March 21-23.

Two other potential South African medallists for the world indoor championships will be 800m star Prudence Sekgodiso and middle-distance athlete Tshepo Tshite.

Olympic finalist Sekgodiso broke the South African 800m indoor record in Karlsruhe, Germany, last week and equalled her time of 1:59.88 at a meeting in Lievin, France on Thursday night.

Tshite, whose preferred distance is the 1 500m, showed that he is in tremendous early-season form in the men's mile at the same Lievin meeting.

He posted a new South African indoor record of 3:54.10 to finish fifth behind Norway's Jakob Ingebrigtsen, who produced an astonishing run to break the world record with 3:45.14. – Source: www.iol.co.za

Ruche has a lot of potential, and after the first day of testing in Portimao, I believe that we can achieve good results this season," said BOE Motorsports team owner, Jose Angel Gutierrez Boe.

Moodley hopes to follow in his mentor, Brad Binder's tracks after he became the first South African to be crowned the Moto3 World Champion in 2016.

"My ambition is to learn as quickly as possible. I want to be fighting at the front to show what I'm capable of. South African fans will be entertained in each category on race days with Brad Binder in MotoGP, his brother Darryn in Moto2, and me in Moto3. I'm proud to be representing my country in one of the most competitive categories in the world," concluded the youngster.

The 2025 Moto3 season features 22 Grand Prix races across 18 countries on five continents. The opening round of the 2025 championship takes place in Thailand on 2 March 2025 and concludes on 16 November 2025 in Valencia, Spain. – Source: www.goodthingsguy.com
